

LOS ANGELES — Southern California knew it would have its work cut out for it Sunday with second-leading scorer and top passer Julian Jacobs out with tendonitis in his left Achilles.

Instead of relying on one player to pick up the slack, the Trojans got contributions from all over the

Bennie Boatwright scored 17 points, Katin Reinhardt and Jordan McLaughlin each scored 14, and USC cruised past Yale 68-56 for its third straight win.

Despite missing Jacobs, the Pac-12 leader in assists and assistto-turnover ratio, the Trojans (8-2) took their first lead five minutes into the game and never trailed the rest of the way.

"Coach asked everyone to pick it up today and we did that," McLaughlin said. "We came out and played loose and everyone was able to produce and contribute to this win."

Trojans coach Andy Enfield said he didn't have a target date for Jacobs' return and described his status as "day-to-day."

USC showed it can survive without him.

McLaughlin reached double

figures in scoring for the first time in five games and added seven rebounds and four assists. Reinhardt scored all 14 of his points in the second half and Darion Clark had seven points, nine rebounds and two blocks in only 14 minutes.

USC outrebounded Yale 34-28, forced 16 turnovers and blocked six shots.

Winning as a team is something we try to preach" Clark said. "One guy goes down, we all got to step up. We've got a lot of good players, a lot of guys capable.'

Makai Mason scored 18 points and Justin Sears had 14 for the Bulldogs (5-5). Yale shot 5 of 19 from 3-point range and scored its fewest points of the season.

The Bulldogs have lost five of seven after starting the year 3-0.

The Irish star possesses a punching power that has made him an undisputed world champion in just seven UFC fights. McGregor also has an uncanny ability to predict not only the outcome of a fight, but the manner in which he'll accomplish his next feat of pugilistic prowess.

McGregor called his shot well before his featherweight title bout with Jose Aldo at UFC 194, vowing he wouldn't need a full round to stop a champion who hadn't lost in 10 years. And then he delivered that shot to the side of Aldo's head to end the fight in just 13 seconds — a little quicker than even he expected.

"Mystic Mac strikes again," Mc-Gregor said.

For as much as McGregor talks, he was sure to get some predictions right. Yet when asked to foresee his own future after he ended Aldo's 18-fight winning streak, McGregor

wasn't quite ready. "I'll give it some time," McGregor said Saturday night. "It's Christmas. Golden State's NBA-record start ended after 24 games with the 108-95 loss to Milwaukee. The Warriors had a 28-game regularseason winning streak going back to last spring, five short of the NBA record 33-game run by the Los Angeles Lakers in 1971-72.

up. On the road, fans and media filled arenas wondering if this was the night they would witness the end of the run.


